WHAT ABOUT ANXIETY?

n the Bible, "anxiety" is used in two ways, as healthy concern and as fret or worry. *Anxiety in the form of realistic concern* is neither condemned nor forbidden. Although Paul could write that he was not anxious (that is, worried) about the possibility of being beaten, cold, hungry, or in danger, he said that he was anxious (that is, concerned) about the welfare of the churches. This sincere care for others put a daily pressure on the apostle and made Timothy "genuinely anxious" (concerned and interested) as well.

Anxiety as fret and worry may have been in the psalmist's mind when he wrote that "anxiety was great within me," and that God's consolation brought joy. In His Sermon on the Mount, Jesus taught that we should not be anxious (worrying) about the future or about life's basic needs, such as food and clothing. We have a heavenly Father, Jesus said, Who knows what we need, and He will provide. In the New Testament epistles, both Peter and Paul echoed this conclusion. "Do not be anxious about anything," we read in Philippians. Instead, Christians are to bring their requests to God with an attitude of thanksgiving, expecting to experience the peace of God, which transcends all understanding. We can cast all anxiety upon the Lord because He cares for us.

Anxiety as fret and worry comes when we turn from God, shift the burdens of life onto ourselves, and assume, at least by our attitudes and actions, that we alone are responsible for handling problems. Instead of acknowledging God's sovereignty and power, or seeking His kingdom and righteousness first, many of us as members, officers, and pastors slip into sinful reliance and preoccupation with our own life pressures.

According to the Bible, there is nothing wrong with honestly facing and trying to deal with identifiable problems of life. To ignore danger is foolish and wrong. But, it is also wrong and unhealthy to be immobilized by excessive worry. Our persisting concerns must be committed in prayer to God, Who can release us from paralyzing fear or anxiety, and free us to deal realistically with the needs and welfare of others and ourselves.

Everyone knows that it isn't easy to "banish anxiety" or to "not be anxious about anything." It is difficult for people to "cast their burdens on the Lord," to trust that God will meet their needs, to wait for His help, and to know when they should take some responsibility for meeting a difficult situation. Anxious people often are impatient people who need help in handling their pressures realistically, and within God's perfect time schedule.

The Christian church leader or minister can be an example of one who is calm and trusting in God to meet needs. Committed brothers and sisters in Christ can help other church members and other community people see God's promises, recognize His power and influence in our daily lives, and take action when appropriate. For many of our brothers and sisters, it is also helpful if they can understand the causes and effects of their persisting anxiety. A Christian counselor is often helpful in this.

Finally, whenever we find ourselves in a threatening, challenging, or potentially dangerous situation, most of us ponder the circumstances and try to determine how we might cope. Here is a tried and proven strategy going forward: "In nothing be anxious; but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known unto God," Philippians 4:6, ASV.

elping church ministries prioritize risk management is a task Adventist Risk Management, Inc. (ARM) accepted at the request of the North American Division (NAD) Risk Management Committee in November 2016. ARM created a set of practical, measurable initiatives called the 2017 NAD Risk Management Initiatives.

By creating these initiatives, ARM encourages all NAD ministries to not only make their ministry a safer space, but also pave a way towards a safer future, hand in hand with ARM. Since the launch of the 2017 NAD Risk Management Initiatives in January, Southern Union ministries have made significant progress on these important goals.

Create Risk Management Committees

ARM reports that several conferences within the Southern Union have already created conference-level risk management committees. Creating such a committee is a crucial step in facilitating a culture of safety in each ministry in your conference. An organization's leadership can address the protection and stewardship of the assets entrusted to them. Implementing a safety committee sets the tone to identify risks, and demonstrates that proactively managing these risks is important to our church's long-term ministry.

If your church or school has not created a risk management committee, now is the time to do so. Key committee members should include leadership, those working with youth, activities coordinators, facility managers, and your safety officer. Your risk management committee should be representative of the various departments in your ministry. Fundamental to the success of this committee and the safety officer is that they are able to bring recommendations to the church board.

Making effective use of a risk management committee allows your organization to prioritize risk management. It allows you to assess your risk, put effective plans in place, and be sure that risk management is a priority across all ministries your organization chooses to pursue.



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MANAGEMENT AT YOUR LOCAL CHURCH

- 1. Provide education in risk management to your church members. Visit AdventistRisk.org for a wealth of free resources that can be downloaded, printed, viewed, and shared with your leaders.
- 2. Conduct and review self-inspection reports that highlight preventable risks. Set dates to address highlighted risks, and record actions completed.
- 3. Remove any 15-passenger vans currently in use, and be sure such vans are not used, rented, or borrowed.
- 4. Build an emergency plan and perform at least one drill annually as part of that plan. Information on how to conduct various drills is available at Adventist-Risk.org. Churches can sign up to participate in Safety Sabbath 2018 at SafetySabbath.com.
- 5. Investigate accidents and document any incidents. Do you know what types of accidents are happening, including the "near misses"? You can proactively prevent disasters by addressing these risks before someone is injured.
- 6. Conduct regular repairs on a seasonal schedule to prevent maintenance-related losses. A vast majority of losses that our churches experience are related to a lack of maintenance.

Remove 15-Passenger Vans

The use of 15-passenger vans has been discouraged and, in some places, actively prohibited by the Adventist Church across the NAD for more than 10 years. One of the 2017 NAD Risk Management Initiatives is a refocus on the removal of all 15-passenger vans from use by NAD ministries by no later than the end of 2017. Tangible steps have been taken to remove Church-owned, rented, or borrowed 15-passenger vans from all use in church ministries.

"For several years, ARM has encouraged church organizations to remove and discontinue operation of this van model," said David Fournier, ARM vice president and chief client care officer. "Recently, NAD Church Working Policy was updated to clarify that this is not a discretionary choice."

The Church in North America voted an action into the NAD Working Policy during the 2016 year-end meetings: "Fifteen-Passenger Van Use — In the interest of safety, denominational organizations shall not purchase, lease, rent or use 15-passenger vans for sponsored activities under any circumstances. Alternatives to 15-passenger vans include: minivans and SUVs, mini-school buses, 15-passenger buses with dual rear wheels," (S 60 31 [GC S 60 30-3] Vehicle Insurance).

Using a privately owned 15-passenger van or even renting a 15-passenger van for a church activity does not protect the



Church from allegations of liability. Key deficiencies of 15-passenger vans are the following:

- A high center of gravity that is increased with passenger seating,
- Instability in crosswinds,
- Seating configurations that place excessive weight on one side, and
- Under-inflated tires, resulting in tire failure or blowouts that cause the driver to lose control of the vehicle.

Removing a row of seats from a 15-passenger van does not make it an approved form of transportation. The vehicle is still the same type of van with the same inherent flaws.

ARM reports that this initiative is already in action throughout the Southern Union. ARM challenges you to act today and remove any 15-passenger vans from use within your ministry.

Conduct Risk Assessments

Maintaining a safe building and premises is important to keep members and guests safe. Evaluating risks on a regular basis helps to prevent potential injuries and unnecessary claims. By regularly conducting risk assessments, such as a building self-inspection, your organization will be better able to track safety hazards and to follow-up on whether those risks were addressed. Your ministry's safety officer is crucial in making sure this specific initiative is carried out. Having the safety officer on your ministry board provides a voice for safety and risk management in the decision-making process of your organization.

Emergency Planning

In March 2017, ARM sponsored the second annual Safety Sabbath event. This event, targeted specifically to churches, invites all churches in the NAD to hold a safety drill during a church service. Safety Sabbath has been designated on the NAD Calendar of Events as the fourth Sabbath in March each year. The event is only one part of the bigger picture that is emergency planning.

Successful preparation for an emergency only comes with practice. It is ARM's

goal that every NAD church hold at least one safety drill annually to better prepare for emergencies. This year's Safety Sabbath focused on two safety drills: fire drill and active shooter drill. Various resources were provided to help churches hold their safety drill, including:

- a "how-to" booklet available in English, Spanish, French,
- promotional materials in both print and digital formats,
- guides for parents and Sabbath School teachers,
- and a checklist to keep church leaders on track.

The Southern Union had a strong participation rate in Safety Sabbath 2017. ARM commends each conference and the Southern Union as a whole for their proactive outlook on emergency planning, and encourages a continued focus on emergency planning and holding safety drills.

Camp Safety

Within a summer of fun, there can be inherent risks at camps. That's why this specific risk management initiative cannot be overlooked. ARM believes that it is important for parents and church constituents to know their Adventist camps operate a safe and nurturing environment for their children. ARM is asking all camps to be accredited with the American Camp Association (ACA).

The Camp Safety page on ARM's website provides various worksheets, information sheets, short papers, Solutions articles, and more to help camp leaders make risk management a priority year-round.

hen Pastor John Chaparro was baptizing Samuel Soto at Poinciana Spanish Church on March 25, 2017, I was holding the microphone. I even offered half of the prayer, but I thought it was best for Sammy to be baptized by the pastor he had led to Christ.

How did it happen?

"I clearly remember it was a Friday afternoon," Soto told me. "When I approached John to invite him one more time to attend the Adventist Youth meeting that night at our church in Añasco, Puerto Rico, I really didn't have my hopes too high.

"John didn't even believe in God," Soto explained, "so, I didn't expect much. Even when he said he would go, I was surprised when he actually showed up!"

Chaparro not only attended church that night, he was eventually baptized. Later, he decided to accept God's call to be a pastor, and many souls have come to Christ as a result of his ministry. One day, as Chaparro was preaching, he felt compelled by the Holy Spirit to tell his church members how Soto had led him to Christ, and, later that day, he sent Soto a thank you text. In the meantime, Soto had left his faith and stopped attending church. Perhaps Chaparro didn't imagine how deeply God would use his text message to touch his friend's heart.

t was a very chilly and early March morning, 4:00 a.m. to be exact, when 58 short-term missionaries from Madison Academy came together at the Nashville airport and set off on an adventure to the Dominican Republic. Weary-eyed yet excited, these students, faculty, and parents were ready to use their talents and gifts to make a difference in a small community they had never even stepped foot in. However, as excited and ready as they thought they were, this experience would broaden their understanding of themselves and the people in the community that they were about to spend the next eight days with.

The goals were simple: build a Sabbath School building and finish the adjacent church by painting the interior and exterior of the building. Along with that, they planned to hold a Vacation Bible School program for the local children each day, and treat as many patients as possible at the two medical clinic sites. This was all to be done in six work days!

Maranatha Volunteers International had all the building materials and plans ready to go; all that was needed to complete the mission was manpower. Most of the students on the trip had never laid a block, volunteered at a VBS, or even been to a foreign country. This would be a learning-by-immersion type of experience, which is exactly what happened.

Students were divided into teams and headed out to each site every morning. They rolled up their sleeves, and the adults taught them what they knew at each site, and the students soaked it in and learned quickly. DEMYSTIFYING MYTHS ABOUT ADVENTIST EDUCATION

MYTH: Adventist school academic standards are low.

REALITY: Adventist schools, regardless of size and location, effectively instruct and nurture students academically, and lead students into meaningful relationships with God as evidenced by both Cognitive Genesis and Value Genesis research.

MYTH: Adventist school curriculum is weak.

REALITY: Adventist schools offer a well-rounded curriculum that is based on national, state, and Adventist standards. Textbooks are written or approved in accordance with denominational beliefs and practices. Curriculum committees made up of K-16 educators from across North America meet every summer to sequentially write and revise curriculum guides. These national and Adventist standards for elementary and secondary subjects have clear indicators and benchmarks that guide teachers in determining what each student should know and be able to do.

MYTH: Adventist school multi-grade classrooms result in inferior education.

REALITY: Student achievement in multi-age, multi-grade classrooms has distinct cognition advantages. Teacher training incorporates brain-based, compatible instructional strategies. Multiple intelligence, cooperative learning, dimensions of learning, models of teaching, subject integration, learning style identification, comprehensive literacy: The movement in and out of these areas, as well as other strategies/programs with different age groups, fosters opportunities for students to both stretch forward and review with confidence. Resourcefulness is nurtured as students learn and glean information — both intentionally and accidentally - while participating in a non-threatening environment. Inclusive education and differentiated instruction take place naturally in these classrooms. Student learning, comprehension, application, and mastery is reinforced by explanation, experience, repetition, and regular opportunities for students to help and/or teach other students in a seamless, safe, and nurturing environment.

MYTH: Adventist school facilities are under-equipped and inferior.

REALITY: Adventist education and education in general has changed significantly over the years. The changes needed to keep pace with society, the requirements of the age we live in, and the technical needs of industry have not taken place fast enough. Not every school has the same facilities, equipment, or financial resources; but, with very few exceptions, every Adventist school does have the basic facilities, equipment, and materials essential for quality education. Inferior schools, historically, are driven more by poor teaching than by inferior facilities and equipment. The Adventist EDGE Comprehensive School Improvement Initiative and School of Excellence programs are designed to place schools on the continuous path of improvement, which leads to excellence in all categories. Ongoing and meaningful teacher training is the key factor in this process. EDGE, "Educators Delivering Great Education," summarizes BCJA'S commitment to excellence for every student and stakeholder.

MYTH: Adventist schools are no different than public schools or other private schools.

REALITY: Adventist schools are based on an educational "Journey To Excellence" which begins on Earth and leads toward Heaven. Adventist Christian education, according to Deuteronomy 6, is a Divine imperative. At BCJA we feel that preparing ourselves and our children for this earth, and ultimately for Heaven, should summarize our purpose. Ellen G. White, in the book Counsels to Parents Teachers and Students, page 401, makes this statement: "The subject of education is one that should interest every Seventh-day Adventist. The Lord says to us, Seventh-day Adventists are not to place themselves under the counsel and instruction of teachers who know not the truth for this time. The molding and fashioning of minds should not be left to women/men who have not comprehended the importance of a preparation for that life which measures with the life of God." We should all agree that this imperative statement is difficult to ignore!

National Score Comparisons

We have known the following about teachers for decades:

"Teacher expertise accounts for more difference in student performance (40 percent) than any other factor," *Ferguson* (2001).

"The differences in impact by the most effective teachers, the top one-sixth of teachers, can be nine months or more, essentially a full year of learning," *Rowen, Correnti, and Miller* (2002).

BCJA students have achieved excellent growth on their Iowa Test of Basic Skills (ITBS) nationally normed achievement tests over the last two years:

- English language arts school-wide total increased by 17.3 percentage points.
- Extended English language arts grades 1-3 total increased by 30 percentage points.
- Math total increased by 14.9 percentage points.
- Science total increased by 10.4 percentage points.
- Complete composite total increased by 11.1 percentage points.

All subject areas — including math — are now scoring above the state average! And, about one-third of our students are performing above the 75th percentile in multiple subject areas!

Curriculum and Honors Classes

BCJA'S curriculum is EDGE-y, and currently offers the following classes beyond the standard curriculum:

- Honors classes include logic training and fallacies of logic, critical thinking, French, Spanish, computer coding, ALICE programming, language arts (literature, English grammar and usage), spelling, vocabulary, debate, advanced math, high school algebra I, classical vocabulary training (Latin and Greek foundation), engineering, and test taking skills.
- Fine arts classes include piano, instrumental, band, foundational bells,

bells, choir, sign language, liturgical movement, acting and improvisation, painting, and puppetry.

- Additional classes and activities include girls volleyball and basketball; boys basketball, soccer, and touch football; and step team.
- After school enrichment opportunities include swimming, robotics, self-defense, and chess.

Our over-arching goal is for BCJA to be known as a school of excellence with emphases on biblical Christianity, academics, leadership, and physical development. In cooperation with her education team, Karohn Young is intent on preparing students to be self-directed, disciplined, autonomous learners who are adept at thinking critically and communicating effectively, while being moral and compassionate individuals.

Young's words to her team at the beginning of this school year express this idea well: "We are not only renewing our commitment to create an ever-evolving educational platform that will meet the demands of the 21st century learner, but also integrating spiritual values into each area of life, focusing on character building, health, leadership, critical-thinking, mission, and outreach."

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Hundreds Celebrate New Pediatric, Women's Services at Florida Hospital Memorial Medical Center

early 450 community members joined Florida Hospital Memorial Medical Center on May 11, 2017, to celebrate the opening of a new unit to care for pediatric patients.

Located on the hospital's fourth floor, the Center for Women and Children is a \$10 million, 34-bed expansion that increases the number of beds at Florida Hospital Memorial Medical Center from 293 to 327.

"This new unit allows us to care for kids in a way we couldn't do before. Now we can provide the whole gamut of pediatric care and treat a wider variety of conditions in children — whether it be for respiratory issues such as asthma, or orthopedic issues like broken bones, or even ear, nose, and throat issues," said Becky Vernon, Florida Hospital Memorial Medical Center director of women and children's services.

The 10-bed inpatient pediatric unit is brightly colored and inspired by the spirit of Daytona Beach, featuring designs of ocean waves, palm trees, and dolphins, as well as cars racing on a track, chairs in the shape of tires and tool chests, and blimps.

"When planning and designing this new unit, we wanted to create a fun, vibrant healing environment that would help put children at ease when receiving medical care," said Darlinda Copeland, Florida Hospital Memorial Medical Center chief operating officer. "This new unit perfectly reflects our community, incorporating the beach Volusia County is famous for, as well as our rich history of racing. Florida Hospital is the official healthcare partner of Daytona International Speedway, and this theme of racing plays out throughout our new unit and into the playroom which is essential to kids' healing."

The new unit also offers 24-inpatient beds for women who are either recovering from surgery or giving birth. Located adjacent to the pediatric unit, the design of these rooms is more tranquil than the pediatric unit, with spacious private rooms, soothing green colors, and warm wood accents.

All 34 rooms in the Center for Women and Children are private and created with families in mind. In the pediatric unit, parents can comfortably stay overnight with their child.

"This was a natural progression in expanding our continuum of care," said Vernon. "Our entire fourth floor is already centered completely on women and children. With this new addition, women and children can receive all of their care on one floor —

whether you are preparing to expand your family, having a baby, or have a sick child."

The fourth floor is home to Women's Care for pregnant mothers to receive prenatal care, the BirthCare Center to deliver babies, and a 16-bed Level II neonatal intensive care unit for sick and premature babies.

In addition, pediatricians Shilpa Sulochana, M.D., and Mihir Tolat, M.D., are located on the fourth floor, providing on-going pediatric care. For children who need specialized care, the fourth floor is also home to Florida Hospital for Children's team of specialized neonatologists and pediatric specialists, available to provide a wide variety of care for children, including cardiology, gastroenterology, orthopedics, pulmonology, and more.

In addition to the pediatric inpatient unit, the Daytona Beach hospital also unveiled an eight-bed pediatric ER to the community, which further reflects the racing theme.

"It is so exciting to see this project completed," Copeland said. "You certainly don't want to see a child in the hospital, but as a parent, if your child needs healthcare, you want them to stay close to home and receive the very best care in an environment that is comforting to both you and your child. When I think of all the families this will help in our community, it is a true blessing to open this new unit."

Music Provides Mission to Thailand

The author had the privilege of sitting down with Chris and Shannon Sorensen and talking with them about their current mission field.

hris and Shannon Sorensen are currently partnering with Adventist Frontier Missions as church planting missionaries in Khon Kaen, Thailand, but it is how they are reaching out to their community that is fascinating.

Khon Kaen is not what one might picture when first thinking of a mission field, as it is a fairly urban university town. It is one of the current "Centers of Influence" projects coordinated by the General Conference, and supported by its division, union, and conference.

The Sorensens' unorthodox approach is perhaps one of the more modern and innovative methods of relational evangelism: they work at a private music school. Peace Music Academy is the entering wedge for the Seventh-day Adventist Church in Khon Kaen. Chris Sorensen functions as its administrator and ukulele teacher, which he says was definitely not what he envisioned

when he dreamed of doing missionary work. Shannon Sorensen leans more toward a whole person approach — she has her hands in just about everything, including homeschooling their two children.

Over the past four years, the mission music school has seen many miracles and accepted many students. Currently, 50 students between the ages of five and 75 attend the school. However, the three full-time music teachers employed by the school are also hired out to various schools in the area, making the impact of Peace Music Academy that much more effective in the community.

Music has a unique way of reaching hearts

and involving families, which has been lacking in many of the English schools, the Sorensens explained, and this further compounds their impact on the community. They regularly welcome student missionaries, and are working to encourage more music majors to take a year off to serve God where they are so desperately needed.

These missionaries are not content with the status quo, though; they have plans for a community center to bolster the Adventist presence in Khon Kaen. When asked what they really want people to know, the Sorensens responded, "This is a great new mission approach that we really hope others can experience themselves, especially young people — adults too, if God is calling. Consider using your musical gifts for ministry. A lot of people think music is a nice 'side thing,' but God can do so much more if we allow Him."



Project Shield Aids Women Globally

n Kenya, Africa, sanitary products are too expensive for the average girl. They resort to using rags, leaves, newspapers, pieces of mattress stuffing, and mud.

In Japan, young girls at one time could not hold traditional chef positions because it was believed their system was off balance each month, interferring with tasting foods prepared.

In Nepal, girls are isolated for a week. They are sent to a shed with little protection from the elements, exposing them to life-threatening illnesses and little human contact.

In Malawi, a woman's cycle brings so much shame it becomes a strict secret; parents do not even talk about it.

In Bolivia, girls keep their menstrual pads out of sight, even out of the trash, because traditional belief is if these items are mixed in garbage, it can lead to sickness or cancer. There are also limited private bathrooms.

In parts of India, folklore has some females believing if they are menstruating, any vegetable they handle will spoil. Girls are advised to avoid cooking during their cycle to avoid polluting the food.

In Afghanistan, they believe that taking a shower during the monthly cycle will cause infertility.

In Iran, nearly half of the girls believe they have a disease.

The challenges of costs, taboos, superstitions of monthly feminine cycles still exist. Project Shield is a ministry to help young girls through their feminine cycle with dignity and knowledge to bless their health.

In the fall of 2016, retired pastor Austin Goodwin, from Virginia, visited the Apison, Tenn., Church, and its "Kids in Stitches" (KISM) sewing ministry. He met the 12-member team, asking them to consider sewing personal feminine kits for young girls of Kenya and other nations.

Goodwin's intense desire was for KISM to create kits in carry bags packed with protective shields, menstrual pads, underwear, clothespins, zip lock baggies, and instruction sheets. With proper care, the Project Shield kits last two-plus years at no cost to the young girls.

The members of KISM initially resisted taking on Project Shield, but God kept pressing this on their hearts. They accepted the challenge and have watched God bless.

In December, Project Shield feminine kit production began in faith with no funding. Prayers soared. Young girls would no longer miss classes for a week each month. They would not resort to being harbored in dark, smelly huts until their cycle passed, or have to search for items to control their cycle.

Disease and death could be greatly reduced. Cultural taboos impacting their emotional and mental health would be minimized, as health education would give them new understanding of their own body processes, with hope for the future. Lives could change.

God convicted KISM that this mission outreach would have the most powerful effect of anything the team could create.

God moves in marvelous wavs. Cuba received 217 kits this past March, and Columbia received 100 kits in May. Upcoming shipments are scheduled for Equador in June, Nigeria in August, Malawi in October, and Haiti in the last quarter of 2017.

Raleigh Gethsemane Church Conducts Cooking Class

tacy Fisher, retired registered nurse and health leader at Gethsemane Church in Raleigh, N.C., discussed with her team the goals for 2017, during meetings held the first couple of months of the year. The team decided that more people in the congregation and the community needed access to healthful cooking and eating practices. Several members of the church were asked to host classes throughout the year. Paul Lawrence, and his wife, Tanzania, requested to teach a cooking class during the planning sessions.

After three weeks of planning, on Sunday, March 26, 2017, from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m., the Lawrences hosted their first cooking class at Gethsemane. The menu consisted of vegan macaroni and cheese, vegan barbecue ribs, vegan beef patties, vegan nachos and chips, and vegan meat loaf. As a special treat, Paul Lawrence provided the recipe for his extra special barbecue sauce. All expenses for the cooking class were paid by the Lawrences. The church attempted to reimburse them for the cost, but the couple donated all money collected to Gethsemane Church school where Tanzania Lawrence teaches.

About 13 to 15 attendees participated. Each attendee was asked to pay a \$3 fee for attending. One of the visitors, who was not Adventist, came to the cooking class on behalf of her daughter who is battling obesity. She was able to leave Gethsemane with some new acquaintances, and with a personal testimony that healthy food can be simply and deliciously prepared.

The Lawrences have individual life stories that include a combined weight loss of 70 pounds between the years of 2011 to 2013. Becoming vegetarian first, and then progressing to adopting a vegan lifestyle along with intermittent fasting, has helped them to maintain an ideal weight. Paul Lawrence believes in the quote "food is medicine." Tanzania Lawrence believes in the text, "...I will put none of these diseases upon thee for I am the Lord that healeth thee," Exodus 15:26. During an interview, she stated that she believes in the following: "Optimum health is not just doing occasional dieting and exercise, but it is committing to a lifestyle change. One must be willing to permanently change old habits that do not work or bring about healing."

Gethsemane Church's health team is excited about the prospect of the Lawrences teaching cooking classes quarterly in the future, as the first one was well received in the church and community.

Ebenezer Community Service Center Distributes \$50,000 in Goods to Community

he Adventist Community Service Center at Ebenezer Church in Greenville, N.C., distributed more than \$50,000 worth of goods donated by two local businesses. Through a long-standing partnership with Good 360 (formerly Gifts in Kind International, founded in 1983), Ebenezer has been the recipient of donated goods from Bed, Bath and Beyond, QVC, and other top retailers. Their most recent acquisition from Advance Auto provided the Adventist Community Service Center with nearly 13,000 items, including approximately 200 batteries worth \$15,000.

The Adventist Community Service Center team, with the help of volunteers from the community, logged more than 100 volunteer hours sorting, de-barcoding, and organizing the donated items for distribution.

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The community lined up to receive goods and services.

During Hurricane Matthew in September 2016, the Adventist Community Service Center accumulated three feet of water, losing everything inside, including shelving and fixtures. They had not been able to distribute goods for six months.

The April 11, 2017, event was a twofold blessing: the grand re-opening of the Adventist Community Service Center, and again being able to service their community's needs. The event was well attended, and included Alvin Freeman, Adventist Community Service director for the South Atlantic Conference in Decatur, Ga.; Brenda Buie, Eastern North Carolina Adventist Community Service leader in Raleigh, N.C.; and Adventist Community Service volunteers from Raleigh and Fayetteville, N.C. WITN News was present to cover the event.

Dollie Lucas, Adventist Community Service leader at Ebenezer Church, notes, "It is a blessing to be able to help those in need. Everybody needs help some time. And, in these tough economic times, monies that don't have to be spent on household items can be used for other necessities. When the community comes to Ebenezer, they get more than just the temporal help. They receive tracts, books, CDs, and DVDs that point them to the One who can meet all their needs."

The Adventist Community Service Center served more than 225 households

during their grand reopening celebration. Goods were available to individuals and families in Beaufort, Craven, Edgecombe, Greene, Lenoir, Martin, Pitt, and Wilson counties. Due to time constraints, some 20-plus households have been rescheduled to receive services at a later date.

With the support of its members and PAM (Purpose Adventist Ministries — a campus ministry at East Carolina University), the Adventist Community Services Department provides dinner once a month at their local homeless shelter. Although PAM is a recently organized ministry, the Adventist Community Service Department has provided the evening meal at the local homeless shelter for nearly 25 years.

God's mercies are to be praised. He poured out such bountiful blessings that there was not room enough to receive them.

Keith Woodard, pastor of Ebenezer Church and a great supporter of Adventist Community Services, says, "This is what service is all about, and it's a great way to share God's love with people." •



WISE Scholarship Provides Financial Assistance for Working Students



Southern students work in a wide range of jobs, and through the WISE program, they can receive dollar-for-dollar matching funds toward their tuition.

Southern Adventist University recently met with school administrators and expressed their desire to assist hardworking students. While many of these donors are alumni who worked their way through college, they realize that working while attending as a full-time student is becoming less common.

As a result of these conversations, the Work Initiative Scholarship Endowment (WISE) was born. This is an umbrella initiative encompassing multiple scholarship funds. The family of alumni Bill and Myrtle Hulsey established one such scholarship in honor of their commitment to Southern. The late Bill Hulsey, who graduated in 1955, served on the Board of Trustees and was a long-term supporter of the University.

Students accepted into the WISE program will receive dollar-for-dollar matching funds, up to \$3,000, for their job earnings during the regular school year. Donors have expressed that they are not looking for perfect GPAs, but for hardworking students who desire to invest in Adventist education.

This program aims to promote a real-life experience as students work part-time during college. It will help them to broaden their skills while developing a better resumé. Additionally, this endowment aims to decrease student debt by allowing students to earn more scholarship funds.

"A scholarship like this can prove to be absolutely transformational in the lives of students on our campus," said Glenn Carter, associate vice president for student finance.

The first donation to the WISE program was received in November of 2016. Since then, the endowment has grown to nearly \$1,500,000. As additional funds are contributed, the hope is that one day all Southern students will have the opportunity to benefit from this program. ●

New Project Integrates Technology into Small Adventist Grade Schools

ith today's rapid technological advances, it can be challenging for schools to keep up. The North American Division, in collaboration with Southern Adventist University's Online Campus Department, has developed a new project called "Our Creator's Space" to integrate technology into small Seventh-day Adventist elementary school classrooms in the Division. The program's primary goal is to provide science, technology, engineering, art, and mathematics (STEAM) resources and lesson plans for multi-grade teachers in schools that don't have dedicated technology.

"We're hoping this project will have a positive impact on getting technology into the curriculum of small schools," said Ryan Harrell, media and creative design specialist for Online Campus.

The program was founded on the premise that God wants people to create new things. It also supports the idea that science and technology do not have to be separate from religion. The name "Our Creator's Space" is based on the concept that God is the ultimate Creator, and wants people to follow in His footsteps of creating.

Our Creator's Space provides a dynamic and ever-growing program that can benefit students, teachers, and their schools. Students benefit from the exposure to STEAM fields, and are encouraged to use problem-solving skills that are applicable in their future careers. Teachers benefit by having access to new technologies, like virtual and augmented reality, co-presentation software, 3-D printing, and robotics, along with instruction on how to use them, learning about new tools and techniques alongside their students.

Consequently, Adventist elementary schools as a whole also benefit as the schools collaborate and foster a sense of community together, ultimately developing new materials and ideas that other teachers can then use.

"By providing this extra layer of support to small schools, we hope that they will be able to create something that gives the glory to our Creator," Harrell said.

La Voz de la Esperanza Celebra su 75 Aniversario en Atlanta

omo una luz en medio de las sombras causadas por la segunda guerra mundial, el programa La Voz de la Profecía, más tarde conocido como La Voz de la Esperanza, surgió en 1942 en Glendale, California. Su misión principal fue llevar el evangelio de salvación a la población del mundo de habla hispana por medio de la radio. El Dr. Braulio Pérez Marcio, fundador, director, y locutor por más de 30 años, nació en España en 1904 y se crio y educó en Argentina. Luego de graduarse enseñó en América Central. En 1942, mientras se desempeñaba en La Habana, Cuba, como pastor y evangelista, fue invitado a conducir este programa de radio que pronto llegó a ser conocido internacionalmente.

A lo largo de su ministerio, dirigió campañas de evangelización en todos los países hispanoamericanos, así como entre la población hispana de los Estados Unidos. Su erudición, sensibilidad como escritor y poeta, y su profundo entendimiento de la lengua y cultura hispanas, lo convirtieron en una personalidad muy influyente entre la audiencia latina. Fue un instrumento del Señor que exaltó la bendita esperanza de Su regreso.

En 1971, cuando la salud de Pérez Marcio estaba disminuyendo, Milton Peverini tomó su lugar durante 24 años, hasta que Frank González se hizo cargo. En la actualidad, y desde 2013, Omar Grieve, de Argentina, y su esposa Nessy Pittau, de Brasil, fueron quienes tomaron el liderazgo. El evangelista Ángel Rodríguez Medina se unió a ellos en el 2014. Todo el personal del ministerio se identifica con la profunda visión de los Grieves de usar los recursos del ministerio para proclamar el mensaje de salvación y exaltar a Jesucristo como la única fuente de esperanza y salvación. Chatworth, Una Iglesia Bendecida

n grupo de laicos altamente motivados en la ganancia de almas se reunió por primera vez el domingo 3 de febrero del 2002 en la iglesia americana de Chatsworth, Georgia, dirigida entonces por el joven pastor Chris Bullock. Luego de 10 meses, de forma milagrosa el Señor proveyó un salón para alquilar en una zona céntrica del pueblo de Chatsworth.

El lunes 16 de diciembre del 2002 se comenzó a limpiar y restaurar el pequeño edificio encontrado, y se le puso un letrero para comenzar las reuniones el sábado 21 de diciembre. Varios miembros de iglesia donaron trabajo, materiales, etc., para hacer del salón un lugar que invite a la reverencia y adoración. Por motivos de espacio, para las actividades de jóvenes se unían a la iglesia de Dalton.

En el 2004 el trabajo misionero de la iglesia comenzó a dar frutos. El grupo comenzó a crecer. Familias enteras, e individuos deseosos de encontrar la Verdad, se unieron a la congregación bajo la influencia del Espíritu Santo. Líderes de otras congregaciones pidieron su traslado al grupo, aportando su experiencia y guía espirituales. Se trabajó arduamente y en julio del 2007 organizaron el nuevo grupo

misión de Ellijay, con 12 personas listas a brillar para Jesús en ese lugar.

En el 2008, bajo el liderazgo del pastor Mendizábal se buscó un lugar más amplio para alquilar o comprar, pero los esfuerzos fueron infructuosos. Mientras tanto, se recibieron donaciones de bancas, se compró el equipo de audio visual, y la iglesia continuaba su obra.

En el 2013 el pastor Samuel García fue asignado al distrito y en Junio del 2014 se encontró un edificio que había estado a la venta durante dos años, con un costo inicial de más de medio millón de dólares. El lugar había sido reposeído por el banco y se le había puesto un precio de \$220,000 dólares. Con la bendición de Dios, tres meses luego de comenzar las negociaciones, se firmó la compra por la cantidad de \$155.000.00. Dios es grande y bueno, alabado sea su nombre.

La congregación se mudó a las nuevas instalaciones en diciembre del 2014. No obstante, allí no terminó el trabajo. El edificio necesitaba remodelaciones, y en el 2015 se juntó la suma de 8,400 dólares, con la que se comenzó la primera etapa de remodelación. Para la segunda etapa el blanco era colectar 25,000 dólares y la hermandad hizo promesas de donaciones para lograr el objetivo. Por la gracia de Dios, se juntaron \$40,000. Muchos miembros que no tenían dinero entregaron automóbiles, y otros bienes. Una familia donó el bautisterio, otra familia donó un piano, muchos miembros donaron horas de trabajo, etc., y la obra edilicia de la iglesia quedó terminada. Todo esto se logró sin haber interrumpido el trabajo misionero, ya que durante este período otras almas se unieron a la familia de Chatsworth por medio del bautismo.

"No hay palabras que puedan describir el profundo agradecimiento al Dios del universo, porque a través de estos catorce años sostuvo a esta congregación con su mano poderosa, y permitió que tenga la algegría de haber sido organizada como iglesia" dice el pastor Samuel García. "A través de estos años, muchos han escuchado el mensaje de salvación; otros se han ido llevando consigo la preciosa semilla sembrada en sus corazones. 


